


Most STIC students are from the far regions of Thailand. The college location demands that they be away from home. Not only that, but living independently is



It is such a huge success for NASA's scientists who have been trying to explore the planet Mars.

NASA's InSight team had got good signals received on Earth at about 5:30 p.m. PST (8:30 p.m. EST) that the spacecraft had already reached Mars on November 26, and the robotic explorer took responsibility in searching and exploring the Mars' surface. InSight will operate on the surface for one Martian year, plus 40 Martian days, or sols, until November 24, 2020. The mission objectives of the two small MarCOs which relayed InSight's telemetry was completed after their Martian

"The science team had been hoping to land in a sandy area with few rocks since we chose the landing site, so we couldn't be happier," said InSight project manager Tom Hoffman of JPL. "There are no landing pads or runways on Mars, so coming down in an area that is basically a large sandbox without any large rocks should make instrument deployment easier and provide a great place for our mole to start burrowing."

Let's Love Writing

Developing the writing skills of Thai students is not a piece of cake. It is a long process, inspired with great determination and numerous writing practices and opportunities. As most people say, writing is the most difficult language skill compared to listening, speaking and reading. It takes millions of trials and errors in planning, drafting, revising, and editing before a single writing composition is polished and passes the standard of quality writing. Organizing ideas is the most difficult point that many students face, especially for those whose English is not their mother language. When someone moves his pen in a time-constrained writing activity, he may experience writer's block in which his brain may seem to stop working and so no ideas come out. Another obstacle is the insufficient knowledge of vocabulary words. Students may have very limited list of word stock that hinder boundless, artistic, critical, and creative writing ideas. Then, there is the most hated element to consider in writing: the grammar. This part of the writing process is a burden of every English language learner. The countless grammar rules and structures discourage them from Finally, students lack the strong-will in developing themselves to be better

writers. Students need to develop that inspiring character to make things simple and trouble free. As STIC students, there are some writing tasks that need to be complied in most of their subjects. This includes diary writing, paragraph and essay composition, poem and short story writing. In my subject, "Mass Media in English", my students are assigned to communicate to their audience through the use of different mass media such as book, newspaper, magazine, radio, TV, video and internet.

Every assignment demands full attention and efforts before it hits the "PUBLISH" button. Along the way, the other four components of writing process are carefully contemplated. It all starts with pre-writing. This stage includes the choosing of topics (if not patterned), brainstorming and outlining, and is succeeded by drafting wherein the writers determine their audience and purpose of writing. Are they to inform, describe, compare, persuade, narrate, or explain? Are their pieces of writing intended for young, old, ordinary or professional audiences? Following the second component is revising, which calls for never-ending repetitions that often bore some writers. This writing process challenges one's patience and staying power. The last component before publishing is editing. This requires grammar experts in order for it to be done perfectly. Relying on you as the sole editor isn't enough. Editing of your work by another source is needed. This "NEWSGAZINE" (newspaper + magazine), STIC On POINT, and STIC Chic are avenues for positive attitudes in fulfilling established STIC tasks.

Students cannot run away from this language skill. Writing is a vital element not only for education but most importantly, in real-life situations. As the editor of this "NEWSGAZINE", I suggest that every learner must have a heart in writing to achieve strength and gain confidence later. Keep on practicing and never stop writing until you master this skill. No one knows; maybe one day your name will be inscribed on some books, newspapers, magazines or journals

Contributing writers, journalists, columnists, correspondents or whatever we call them, together with the lecturer, hope that this "NEWSGAZINE" achieves its purpose.


