what they want to learn. This approach sparks motivation, engagement, and the development of invaluable skills such as critical thinking and decision-making.

Discuss: Nurturing Critical Thinking

Transitioning to the "Discuss" phase, students engage in discussions, collaborate, and broaden their horizons. This process nurtures critical thinking, enhances communication abilities, and sharpens research skills.

Display: Unleashing Creativity

The "Display" phase encourages students to express what they've learned in imaginative and creative ways, refining their presentation and communication skills.

Discern: Fostering Accountability

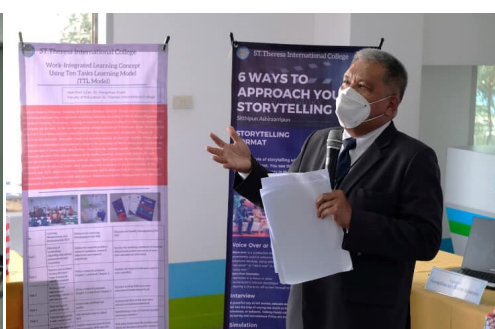
In the "Discern" phase, students are actively involved in assessing each other's work, promoting accountability, constructive feedback, and a culture of continuous improvement.
